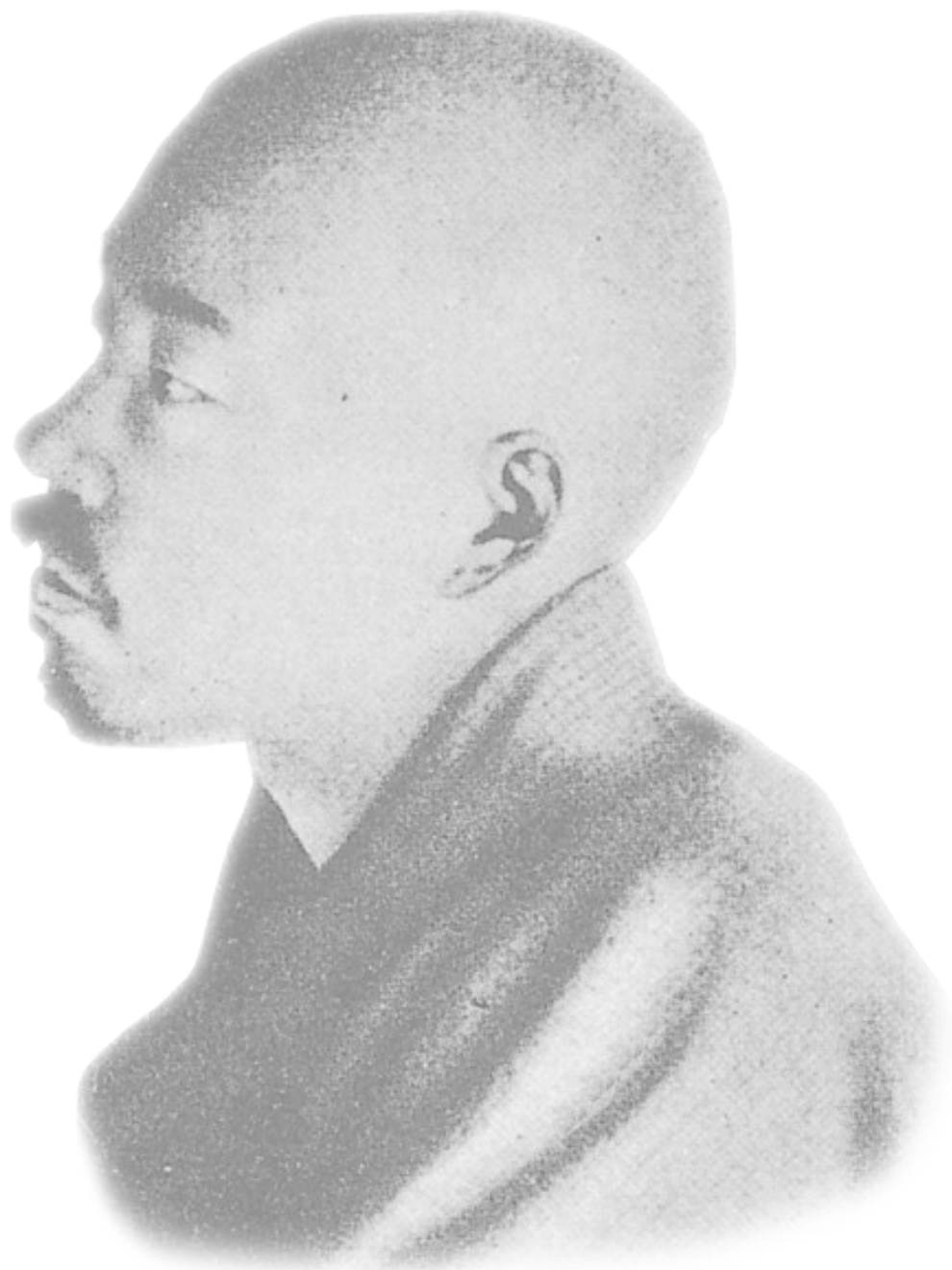

welcome to Issue 7 of 民句 *folk ku* journal

民句 *folk ku* journal is dedicated to the founder of modern haiku, Master Masaoka Shiki. Each issue features a selection of his haiku and translations alongside contemporary works inspired by his first principle – *shasei* 寫生 (sketches from life). Accordingly, the haiku, senryu and tanka within the pages of 民句 *folk ku* journal are informed by real-life experiences.

Following on from *Issue 5: water* and *6: trees* we thought we'd take a short break from themed issues and leave the options open for your faves. 民句 *folk ku* Issue 7 showcases more than 250 special folk memories from contributors around the world; this time we added an extra three countries to our growing list – Denmark, Norway and United Arab Emirates. Huge thank you and congrats to our talented *folk-kuers* from more than 20 countries and territories.

The 30+ English translations of Shiki's poems were accessed (in Japanese) from The Matsuyama Shiki Memorial Museum 松山市立子規記念博物館 database; these are woven throughout the text to sit alongside the *folk ku* of our contributors. We are extremely grateful for the use of this extraordinary and free to access public library.

An iris, a garden, a moment

This issue begins with an iris. The images on the front and back covers comes from *The Flowers and Gardens of Japan*, published in Soho Square, London, in 1908. The paintings were made by Ella Du Cane; the words were written by her sister Florence. Together, they recorded the gardens, flowers and places they encountered in Japan, turning their travels into something that could be carried home and remembered. There is something fitting about beginning our journey here, because *shasei* has always been concerned with the act of noticing: a flower, a garden, a sound, a season, a fleeting moment.

The story behind the cover images begins far from Japan and shares a history with *folk ku*'s homestate. Ella Du Cane was born in Hobart, Tasmania, in 1874, during the final year of her father's governorship of Tasmania. Her sister Florence was born in Hobart five years earlier, in 1869. After their father, Sir Charles Du Cane, completed his term as Governor, the family returned to England, where the girls grew up at Braxted Park in Essex. The family were wealthy and privileged, and the girls' education was largely private, with a governess and the gardens and landscape around them becoming an important part of Ella's artistic world.

The Du Canes themselves came from a Huguenot family, descended from Protestant refugees who had settled in England after fleeing religious persecution in continental Europe. That history formed part of the family's longer story of movement across countries and generations. The sisters would continue that tradition in their own way, travelling widely and making observations of other places central to their lives and work.

Ella became a watercolour painter, while Florence wrote about the places they encountered. Their Japan travel book brought these two forms of observation together: Ella's paintings and Florence's descriptions. The result was not simply a record of travel, but a way of preserving places, flowers and moments so that they could be remembered by people who had been there, and imagined by those who had not.

The illustrations are strikingly specific: not simply "an iris" or a "garden", but *Irises*, *Horikiri*, *Wistaria*, *Kameido*, *Lotus at Kodaiji*, *Cherry Blossom*, *Chion-in Temple*, *Lilies on the Rocks*, *Atami*, *Pine-tree at Matsushima*. The sisters were recording particular places and encounters. And like *folk ku* journal, the Du Cane sisters' *The Flowers and Gardens of Japan* also travelled around the world, with agents distributing it through publishing offices in New York, Melbourne, Toronto and Calcutta.

Ella's approach to painting also belonged to a wider nineteenth-century movement towards observing and recording the world directly. Realist artists increasingly turned their attention towards ordinary people, places and everyday life, looking closely at what was actually there rather than idealising their subjects. Ella's watercolours were very different from the work of the European realist painters, but her attention to particular places, flowers, landscapes and moments belongs to this broader culture of close observation.

Painting the particular

Around this same time, Master Masaoka Shiki was doing something similar in a very different setting with Japanese verse. Shiki was born in Matsuyama in 1867, seven years before Ella Du Cane, and died in 1902, at only thirty-four. Shiki came from a low-ranking samurai family with generations of service

to the Matsuyama domain, and his early education combined traditional Confucian learning with the new schools of the Meiji era. He later continued his studies in Tokyo, although increasing illness would shape much of his short life. During the 1890s he became one of the great reformers of Japanese haiku, arguing for a poetry grounded in observation of the world as it was actually seen. His idea of *shasei* encouraged poets to look closely at the ordinary world and record what they encountered.

Florence wrote about places. Ella painted them. Shiki turned places and passing moments into *shasei*. Their methods were different, their lives very different, but there is a striking connection between them: all three understood the value of stopping to look. A garden, a flower, a bell, a path, a particular tree or the changing season could become worth preserving simply because, for one brief moment, someone had really noticed it.

The moment continues...

And this is where the story shifts to the present. The poets gathered in this journal are separated from Shiki by more than a century, and from the Du Cane sisters by geography, technology and circumstance. They write from different countries, cultures and landscapes, from Africa, Asia, Australia and the Pacific, Europe, the Middle East, North America, South America and beyond. Some may travel; others may write from the place where they live. Their subjects may be Japanese, Tasmanian, African, Asian, European, Middle Eastern, Australian, Pacific, North American, South American, or entirely personal; urban, domestic or drawn from the natural world. Yet the essential act remains unchanged: someone sees something, they pause, and craft the moment into something to keep.

A century ago, Ella Du Cane could sit before an iris in Japan and preserve it in watercolour. Florence could describe the place so that someone in London or another part of the world might imagine it, or a future traveller might remember it. Shiki could notice a sound and a piece of fruit at a temple and transform that experience into poetry. Today, a poet can look out of a window, walk down a street, sit beside the sea, notice a bird, a shadow, a flower opening, rain on glass. Or simply observe something that would ordinarily pass unnoticed and do exactly the same thing.

From sketch to haiku

That is one of the things that makes haiku so extraordinary. It belongs to no single country or century. Its roots are Japanese, but its reach is borderless. A haiku does not require its writer or reader to have visited Japan. It asks only that we look closely at the world around us. Shiki understood that poetry could be found not only in the beautiful or extraordinary, but in the ordinary, the mundane and the easily overlooked: a fruit, a bell, a flower, a passing moment. Sometimes the simplest things are the ones that stay with us. Perhaps this is why the iris is such an appropriate place to begin.

It connects two Tasmanian-born sisters, an English painter and a writer working in Japan and publishing in Soho, London, in 1908, with a Japanese poet born in 1867, and with poets writing today in places neither of them could have imagined. It connects travel with memory, painting with poetry, Japan with Tasmania, the past with the present. And it connects all of us with the simplest and oldest part of the process: to stop, to look, and capture a trace of what we saw.

Haiku is timeless because the world is always changing, yet we are always capable of noticing small things. It is borderless because wherever we live, there is always something in front of us waiting to be seen. Thank you for joining us on another *folk ku* journey. We will be taking a short break but look forward to *Issue 8: Islands*, which will open for submissions 25 March to 15 April 2027, to be published May/June. It is with deep respect and great honour that *King River Press* offers the verses within 民句 *folk ku* journal as a memorial gift to Master Masaoka Shiki.
